Triennial 2022 election date

The recommended election date is Wednesday 7 September 2022.

Please note that the staff elections must be held at the same time as the parent elections.

Appointing a returning officer

If your board has not yet appointed a returning officer, this must be done at least 63 days prior to your election date. If you are using the recommended election date of 7 September 2022, then 6 July 2022 is the legislated deadline. To appoint a returning officer, use our template [Returning Officer Letter of Appointment](#) and advise the returning officer to register at schoolboardelections.org.nz

Have you checked that your returning officer has registered the number of parent representative positions on the schoolboardelections.org.nz

You will also need to appoint a Returning Officer to run the student board member election. The Ministry does not provide funding specifically for this election however they can be the same Returning Officer as the one appointed to the Triennial Staff and Parent election.

Do you know your board's constitution?

A board's constitution is the number of parent representative positions on your board. Generally, boards have 5 parent representative positions, but there are exceptions. Boards have the power to increase or decrease the number of positions to no more than 7 and no fewer than 3.

Promoting the elections

Remember that promoting the election is the responsibility of the board, not the returning officer.

Your board may like to appoint an election organiser to look after promoting the election. For more information on this role refer to the [school board election website](#).

There is a variety of election [promotional material](#) on the site that your board can use including posters, brochures, flyers, and social media banners.

Check your school roll

If you have not yet appointed an RO it is recommended that you begin the task of ensuring the parent and staff electoral roll is accurate.

For stand-alone intermediate schools, please also remember that parents of students enrolled in year 6 at nearby years 1-6 (contributing) primary schools, who are likely to be enrolled as a full-time student at your school in 2023, are eligible to participate in your 2022 parent election.
